




+ Effortless Meditation Wednesdays June 3 - July 8 6:00 – 7:00 p.m.

And have you too been trudging like that, sometimes almost forgetting how wondrous the world is and how miraculously kind some people can be?


And have you too decided that probably nothing important is ever easy?


Not, say, for the first sixty years.

New LGBTQIA Group Forming!





A Note From the Board of Trustees:

We thank all of you who attended the Annual Meeting, asked your questions, shared your thoughts about our path forward, and then voted. And thanks to those of you who could not be at the meeting and voted via absentee ballot. As we look forward to the coming year, we are excited by the quality of leaders you have elected to the Program Council and the Leadership Development Committee.

We commend the congregation for the spirit in which you asked questions and expressed your ideas and opinions during the Annual Meeting. We also have deep gratitude for the many hours of concentrated work done by the CDPC with input from our BUC architects, and for the visionary work of inFORM Studio. Together with all of you, they have made this possible.

We are pleased that the vote authorized us to seek necessary long-term financing for the cost of the renovation and repair projects to our campus that are not covered by your capital campaign pledges. We encourage those who are uncertain of this path to keep open minds and to keep asking your questions as we go along.

The Board has begun developing a plan for communicating our progress to the congregation as we move along. Updating the Social Hall will likely occur this summer - we will hold town halls before we begin and after we complete that work. We will also hold town halls periodically during the construction period, which will likely begin in April, 2016 and last for about 6 months. We are committed to keeping everyone updated and current during the process. We will provide ways for you to make comments and ask questions as we go along as well. Much of this will gear up during the winter. At present, the CDPC and the Construction Manager will be working together to develop plans for the timing of construction, with every effort to minimize disruptions. Of course, there will be messes and disruptions, but we are hoping to be able to maintain as many activities as possible during the construction.

The next steps for the CDPC include forming four sub-teams: a team to be the primary interface with the Construction Manager; a team to be the primary interface with the congregation, for gathering further input and regular outgoing communications; a team to research and put together the bridge and long-term finance packages; and a team for architectural review and guidance.

Thank you again for your support. We believe it will be of great value to BUC now and into the future. As several people pointed out at the Annual Meeting, it is the people and the connections that are the most important in our beloved community. We believe that working together during this time will allow us to enhance both our campus and our community.

- First of all, mark your calendar: Setup and Intake begins on Sunday, Sept. 27. The sale runsOctober 1-3. And then, look over these ideas for new ways to help.
- 2. We have recently been blessed with lots of large-sized donations. Unfortunately, we have not been as lucky with our trucking crews. In order to keep from wearing out our few drivers, we would like to reserve the truck for furniture. To accommodate the aged and infirm population who have no good way to get their Rummage to BUC, we propose: Rummage Uber! If you don't have time to volunteer during the week but could spend some time collecting donations from other BUCers, please let the committee know. You can do this on your own schedule (as long as it gets to BUC by Tuesday, Sept. 29).
- 3. Laura Lee and her Silent Auction team often receive lovely, valuable items that need more specialized sale attention. "You should try to sell this on eBay," is something she often hears. Unfortunately, Laura just doesn't have room on her business cards to add eBay Czar to her other dozen job titles. We could really use an eBay champion. If you have (or want to develop) the skills and the time to market these nicer donations, please let the committee know. A big advantage is that you can do this entirely on your own schedule—it need not be tied to the actual sales.

Religious Education

Perhaps you are new to BUC and have been puzzled (and a little annoyed) when you hear about "ROPE." Is this a church curriculum dedicated entirely to challenge courses? Packaging? Lariat-throwing?
