Plate Collection

The 2010 budget allocates 35% of the Sunday morning offerings to go to charities sponsored by Birmingham Unitarian Church members. The other 65% goes to BUC's internal needs because of this year's budget shortfall, though we hope to return to the full 100% Charity allocation as soon as possible. Meanwhile, thanks for your patience and your generous donations.

Each sponsor fills out a Common Grant Application, which can be found on our web site under "Church Business" in the left hand column. The next applications will be due by April 1st.

For the next six weeks that portion of our plate collection will go to Freedom House, sponsored by Alexa Stanard. This is a temporary home for survivors of persecution from around the world who seek legal shelter in the United States and Canada. Freedom House's mission is to uphold a fundamental American principle, one inscribed on the base of the Statue of Liberty, providing safety for those "yearning to breathe free."

Guided by their belief that all persons deserve to live free from oppression and to be treated with justice, compassion and dignity, Freedom House's goals are:

To offer a continuum of care and services to persons living in their shelter, as well as other refugees in need, and to advocate for systemic change which more fully recognizes the rights of refugees and asylum seekers.

The follow spot slowly began lighting up the center stage runway which jutted out into the audience to reveal a lone, powerful, black man, bald with a full beard, bringing us rapidly into his pained misery, tears rolling down his cheeks. ... There aren't many solo, acoustic artists with the confidence, talent and professionalism of Josh White, Jr."


I had an encounter at church this week that puzzles me some. She said, “Hi. My name is ---- . “I’m a member here but we’ve never met.” I don’t recall what I said to her but what I thought was, “it’s halfway through January and I’ve been here since August. That’s almost six months. If we haven’t met, in what way or ways are you a member?”

Some years ago this story was making the rounds of church newsletters: In a smallish country church, where one was conspicuous when absent, the minister could not help but notice the absence of a local farmer. She knew of no reason why he should absent himself from Sunday services so one afternoon she drove out to the farm. As she approached the house, she saw that the door was ajar so she let herself in. Farmer Jones was quietly sitting in front of the hearth warming himself by the fire. Without uttering a word, the minister took a chair and she sat by farmer Jones’ side. They sat in silence. After a while, she took the tongs from the fireside tools and removed a burning coal from the fire. She placed it on the brick hearth away from the fire. After a few minutes, the coal turned black. She picked it up barehanded because it was now relatively cool and she replaced it among the other burning coals. Soon, the coal glowed red again and burned merrily among the other coals. The minister pushed her chair away, rose and left without exchanging a single word with farmer Jones.

He lived to be a very old man and never again missed church.

Children & Youth Religious Education

Eleanor McGuire, Director of Religious Education for Children

The February's *Death and Beyond* rotation is part of a larger objective of sharing with our children how our religion helps us through our life passages. Death is an emotional and complex topic for children but one that needs to be openly & gently discussed, especially in a safe and supportive place. This rotation introduces the idea of the legacy each person leaves behind. It explores that those who have departed live on in the memories and hearts of the living. It continually refers to death as the "next place" we are all going, wherever or whatever we believe that experience will be. It asks: "How do other religions view death?" and "What practices do people have to help them feel connected to their dead or departed?" It explores four perspectives on death:

- Re-incarnation – What do some Buddhists and Hindus believe happens to a person when he/she dies? What does it mean "to join with the Universe?" What does it mean "to live another life?"
- Heaven & Hell – What do some Christians, Muslims and Jews believe happens to a person after he/she dies? What is Judgment Day? What do UUs believe about a person's legacy?
- Ancestor Veneration – What is the significance of the Day of the Dead holiday? Who is being welcomed back?
- Cemeteries & BUC's Memorial Glen – Why do so many people find spiritual connection at the site where their loved ones are laid to rest? How do significant objects or places help us feel close to those who have died? Why do some people find comfort in nature?

Youth Classes

6th & 7th grade will learn about the B’Hai faith with an overview of the tenets and worship practices, welcoming a visitor and synthesizing the knowledge with what they understand of UUism and other neighboring faiths. They will begin to learn about our American Methodist Episcopal neighbors at the end of the month.

8th graders will spend time with the coming of age “ROPE” (Rite of Passage Experience) curriculum, performing a service project, congregational interviews, and learning about BUC’s history in the month of February. They will end the month by exploring theological language and their own theological literacy with “Theological Jeopardy!”

9th – 12th graders meet on Sunday morning to expand their knowledge of 20th century Spiritual Leaders and a diverse range of Morals and Ethics espoused by these leaders. The month will draw to a close with an examination of our UU Congregational Leaders and work on Youth Sunday.

YOUTH SUNDAY is a full worship service prepared and presented by the Youth of Birmingham Unitarian Church. The 9th – 12th graders take a leading role in the service, and welcome musical or artistic offerings from 6th – 8th grade youth to incorporate into service. This is an inspiring and worth-ship-full Sunday experience for Youth and Adults. Please mark your calendars to make sure you are in church for First (9:30a) or Second (11:15a) service SUNDAY MARCH 14!


