


It is May and it is Spring! Fruit trees are in full bloom and Ma Nature is showing off a bit. I love it. When I was a boy, my grand-father planted a huge vegetable garden. May was planting month. I spent as much time as I could with that wise old man and I learned most of what I know at his side. Planting was an important ritual for him. If you planted scrupulously, the harvest would be good. Not a bad metaphor for life in a Unitarian Universalist church. From the beginning of our relationship, I understood my primary task to be to help you be ready for a settled minister. Together we planted a lot of seeds. The nature of interim ministry is that I won't be around for the harvest. In

Genesis 1:31 we read: "God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good." It is presumptuous as all get out to compare our work to God's work, but we have done holy work together and I pronounce it "very good." You are a solid congregation. An extraordinary church. I'm extremely grateful to have had the opportunity to be your companion for these past months. We're not quite done (is anything ever?) but our time together is drawing to a close.

Several people have asked me where I will be next year. I honestly do not know. But one way or the other, I will be in New England. With my Mom now 91 and Ellie's Mom 95, Ellie's father's death last March made clear that we must be in New England. When I know more, I'll tell you more.

I've just returned from my annual week-long Interim Minister seminar, which I fondly call the "piranha – fest" where we learn what congregations are looking for Interim Ministers next year and we all converge like a swarm of hungry fish to put our names in for consideration; a process that will begin with great intensity and end with as much intensity, in the next couple of weeks. And while I focus on "piranha-fest" and looking for my next job, the issue of next year for you here at BUC is very present on my mind and I'm sure for all of you.

Many of you have ongoing questions about the search process and the Transition next year to either a Settled or Consulting Minister. What is the difference? This was the topic of my recent monthly meeting with the Transition Team.

The Transition Team is here to help you understand the process, answer your questions and get your feedback. They filter what they learn to me, the board and the search committee but because they are not involved directly in the search are more available than those who are immersed in the ongoing and very intense search process to discuss and give feedback. They have been a wonderful resource this year.

Transition Team members are listed in the Order of Service (Dan Boyce, Melinda Henderson, Maurice Lefford, Grace Rising, Susie Sherman-Hall and Craig Spangler) and are available, after first or second service or via email or phone call. They want to hear your concerns and questions and dialogue with you about the process, fears, hopes etc.

Please seek them out they are waiting to hear from you!

Even if you completed one then, please return a new updated one now. Additional blank forms will always be available in the church office. If your information ever changes, please inform the office of your corrections. Do keep a copy of your form with your own records. Remember to inform those you named that they have been so designated by you.

Senior Minister Search Committee News

We are in the middle of our late search, and are pleased by your support of the process. As with the standard search process, there is confidentiality involved, and we will continue to share what we can. What is a late search?

It is exactly that. This year, 58 UU churches were in search of ministerial leadership. According to the UUA, at least 10 of those churches did not have a final ministerial candidate. We were then given the opportunity to look again at the ministerial pool through a late search.

So, it's like looking at leftovers? We'd be settling for less?

Actually, it's a great opportunity to look at ministers that were quite interesting, but because we had to narrow down our selection, did not make it into our "final three". The flip side of that is that there may be some outstanding candidates that did not look at BUC in the first round (In the search process we only have access to those ministers who submit their names for our consideration). And we are in no way "settling". We will use due diligence just as we did in the initial search. If we do not find a candidate to present to the congregation, then we will take part in the UUA search process again next year, and will have a consulting minister for that time.

What is a consulting minister, and how does it differ from an interim?

An interim minister's role is to help the congregation during the transition process from a prior minister to the newly called minister. The interim minister will have "work" for the congregation to do (remember the creation of our covenant?) to prepare a church to welcome a new minister. A consulting minister can

be given a set of tasks by the board that they feel need to be worked on so that a church can be its best. A consulting minister is responsible for the pulpit, just as the interim minister is.

I just want things settled.

Agreed. That is the ultimate goal, to call a minister that will be a great fit for BUC. We all want a minister that will “walk with us” on our religious journeys. A good minister can be a catalyst for stimulating thought and action. But remember that the church’s foundation is its people, and we have a wonderful congregation full of people with great energy, leadership and heart. If we do have another year of search, it is an opportunity to strengthen our connections, celebrate being together, and continue to prepare our church home for a settled minister.


